Tonight's Matchup

The Fort Lauderdale Strikers take on the Puerto Rico Islanders in the second leg of the NASL Semifinal to decide which team advances to the NASL Championship Series beginning on Saturday, Oct. 22. The Strikers will try to remain unbeaten against the Islanders this season at Lockhart stadium (1-1-0).

Last Match • 10/8 vs. Puerto Rico Islanders

The Fort Lauderdale Strikers defeated the Puerto Rico Islanders at Juan Ramon Loubriel Stadium, 3-1, continuing their scoring streak after beating FC Edmonton 5-0 the week before.

After a first half without many chances the Strikers opened the scoring in the 49th minute when halftime substitution Martin Nunez buried a Lance Laing cross to make it 1-0. Nunez had come on for captain Abe Thompson at halftime after Thompson received an injury in the first half.

Fort Lauderdale extended their lead in the 82nd minute when Walter Restrepo took a pass near midfield and dribbled to the top of the Islanders 18-yard box and fired a perfectly placed shot into the top corner of the net. Puerto Rico goalkeeper Ray Burse dove to try to deflect the ball, but it was out of reach.

The Islanders answered right back in the 84th minute to make it 2-1 when Gregory Richardson found Jonathan Fana in the small penalty area where Fana shot far post for the goal. Richardson and Fana were both second half substitutions for the Islanders.

The Strikers added their final goal in second half stoppage time when a Puerto Rico turnover left Mike Palacio alone in the penalty area. Palacio sent a cross to the far side of the net where Brian Shriver was waiting to pocket his third goal of the playoffs.

Next Match ● 10/22 vs. NSC Minnesota Stars/Carolina Railhawks

Should the Strikers advance, the next match will be the first game of the NASL Championship Series against either NSC Minnesota Stars or Carolina Railhawks. With a win, tie or loss by one goal tonight against Puerto Rico, the Strikers will qualify to the NASL Championship Series. The NSC Minnesota Stars, who won the first leg at home, have an opportunity to advance with a victory or draw against the RailHawks. If Minnesota keeps the lead and wins against Carolina, the Championship Series will be hosted on Oct. 29 at Lockhart Stadium. If Carolina advances, the home game against Carolina will be on Oct. 22.

Head Coach • Daryl Shore

Shore, 41, is a New York native who graduated from South Plantation High School, in Plantation, Florida. He played in college as a goalkeeper for Birmingham-Southern College and went on to play professionally for the Birmingham Grasshoppers and the New Orleans Riverboat Gamblers. After managing professional organizations all over the country such as the New Orleans Storm and the Lehigh Valley Steam, he began a ten-year tenure for the Chicago Fire as an assistant coach. Shore served as an assistant to four head coaches with Chicago, including Bob Bradley, Juan Carlos Osorio and former Striker Dennis Hamlett. He also played a significant role in the growth of the Fire's player development program. He was hired last July as the head coach for the Blues.

Assistant Coach • Jim Rooney

Rooney began his professional career in South Florida with the Miami Fusion in the MLS. The American midfielder made 67 appearances for the club from 1999 – 2001 scoring 12 goals in the process. Rooney also spent time with the New York MetroStars (now the New York Red Bulls) and the New England Revolution. Rooney served as team captain of the Fusion during the 2000 and 2001 seasons.

1 • Nic Platter • Goalkeeper • 6'1 • 185 lbs • 11/22/1981

Platter is a California native that began his college career at the University of California at Davis. He had a stellar career where he became the all time shutout and saves leader, for the school. Platter signed with Minnesota in 2005 and spent the first five years of his professional career making 85 appearances for the club. He signed with the Carolina Railhawks in 2010, appearing in 10 matches

2 • Cristian Quinones • Defender • 6'3 • 172 lbs • 12/31/1990

Quiñones, a native of Colombia, has spent time playing at the professional and youth international levels. The 6-foot-3 center back most recently played for Independiente Sante Fe in the Colombian first division. The three seasons he spent with the club were his first as a member of a senior professional team. Before playing for Independiente Santa Fe, Quiñones spent time with the reserve teams of first-division Colombian clubs Deportivo Cali and Independiente Medellín in 2006. A year earlier, he was a member of the youth academy at another one of the nation's bigger clubs, Once Caldas. Quiñones has represented Colombia at the U-15 and U-17 international levels, participating in several South American international tournaments. He also took part in a pair of U-20 national team training camps, but never made an appearance for the team.

5 • Tony Stahl • Defender • 6'3 • 180 lbs • 5/11/1985

Stahl is originally from Tuusula, Finland where he played with several teams—including FC Espoo, as well as HJK Helsinki youth teams. After being named 2009 Big East Midfielder of the Year at the University of Connecticut, Stahl was drafted in the 2nd round (17th overall) by the Philadelphia Union in the 2010 MLS SuperDraft.

6 • Lance Laing • Defender • 6'2 • 180 lbs • 2/28/1985

Laing is a native of Trelawny, Jamaica where he also began his professional career with local clubs Harbourview FC and Village United. The young defender has also represented the Jamaican National Team several times at the under 17 level in 2004-2005 and the senior national team in 2008-2009

7 • Polo Morales • Midfielder • 5'9 • 135 lbs • 3/6/1990

Leopoldo Morales, nicknamed "Polo", was born in Mexico, but grew up and attended high school in Livermore, CA. He comes to the Strikers on loan from Mexican club Tigres, based just outside the city of Monterrey, Mexico. Morales was scouted in high school by Chivas USA and was also chosen to participate on the U-21 Mexican national team.

8 • Pecka • Midfielder • 5'7 • 152 lbs • 5/2/1989

Wellington Paeckart, known simply as Pecka, was born in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil and played his youth career in the academy of one of Brazil's most storied clubs, Flamengo. He played mainly on Flamengo's U-23 team in the Brazilian Championship. Pecka was also chosen for the U-18 Brazilian national team and competed in the Sendai Cup in Japan in 2006.

9 • Abe Thompson • Forward • 6'0 • 180 lbs • 1/12/1982

Thompson a Virginia native, began his college career at the University of Maryland where he spent 4 seasons. He had a stellar career for the school as he was named Herman Trophy Finalist in 2004 and 2005. After college, FC Dallas drafted Thompson in 2005 where he spent four years making 69 appearances and scoring 14 goals. In 2008 he was traded to Kansas City and spent one season but was soon traded again to Houston. Last March, Miami FC signed Thompson where he made 26 appearances and scoring 9 goals in his first season

10 • Mike Palacio • Midfielder • 5'11 • 180 lbs • 8/29/1986

Palacio is a Long Island native who most recently played for the Serbian club, FK Radnicki Obrenovac. He had high expectations as the 21st overall draft pick in the MLS Supplemental Draft by the New York Red Bulls but his MLS career was short-lived when he tore his ACL. A season later, Palacio played for the Long Island Rough Riders (PDL) where he scored eight goals and assisting on four others in just 14 appearances. The Stony Brook University alum has played two seasons for Radnicki Obrenovac

11 • David Santamaria • Forward • 5'11 • 175 lbs • 12/15/1990

The Colombian-American forward played at Miami FC's youth academy and quickly became a star for Miami Sunset Senior High School. Soon after, he was offered a scholarship to Jacksonville University where he played one season.

12 • Aaron Wheeler • Forward • 6'5 • 185 lbs • 5/11/1988

Wheeler, a Maryland native, led his high school to the 2005 Baltimore County championship title and was later named a two-time NSCAA All-South Atlantic Region First Team selection, as well as a three-time All-South Atlantic Conference First Team member.

13 • Adam West • Defender • 6'0 • 175 lbs • 5/7/1986

West started his career at the University of Washington where he played from 2004-2006. In the spring of 2007, the Seattle Sounders signed West where he won the 2007 USL First Division Championship. He later signed with the Rochester Rhinos in 2010, where he made 7 appearances. West was signed after participating in the NASL Combine in Fort Lauderdale earlier this month

15 • Scott Gordon • Defender • 6'4 • 190 lbs • 4/6/1988

Scott Gordon played his college soccer at Lynn University in his hometown of Boca Raton, Florida where he started in 28 games, capturing five goals, four assists, and 14 points. Gordon was drafted by FC Dallas in the 2011 Major League Soccer SuperDraft as the 53rd overall pick. He was the only NCAA Division II student-athlete drafted.

17 • Bryan Arguez • Midfielder • 6'2 • 185 lbs • 1/13/1989

Arguez, a South Florida native, began his career with the United States U-17 team in 2005 and continued on with the U-20 team and became the eventual eleventh overall pick in the 2007 MLS SuperDraft. Later in 2007, Arguez signed with Hertha BSC of the German Bundesliga where he played for one season. Arguez was later named to the U.S. roster for the 2007 FIFA U-20 World Cup in Canada and again for the FIFA U-20World Cup in Egypt, scoring a goal against Cameroon.

18 • Yoximar Granado • Midfielder • 5'7 • 160 lbs • 3/31/1992

Granado hails from Cali, Colombia. Playing as a wide midfielder or as a removed forward, Granado will add yet another weapon to the Strikers' offense. Granado is a product of CDEF Carlos Sarmiento Lora and has spent time with Argentina's First Division side Quilmes, as well as with the Chicago Fire of MLS

19 • Walter Restrepo Uribe • Midfielder • 5'8 • 169 lbs • 6/21/1988

Walter comes to the Strikers after spending much of his earlier career in Colombia where he played for two Colombian First Division teams in Boyaca Chico and Deportes Tolima. He was on the Deportes Tolima team which finished second in the Copa Mustang in 2006. Walter also played on the U-17 Colombian National Team.

20 • Gerson Mayén • Midfielder • 5'8 • 155 lbs • 2/9/1989

Mayén rejoins the Strikers on loan from MLS side Chivas USA for the rest of the 2011 season. Mayén appeared in nine games for the team last season. A native of Los Angeles and veteran of local youth clubs Arsenal FC and the Chivas USA U-18's, Mayén was signed by Chivas USA on March 27, 2008 after training with the club throughout preseason. Mayén made his MLS debut in Chivas USA's second game of the 2009 season, a 2-0 win at FC Dallas on March 29, and also earned his first assist in the match. Mayén played in 12 games and led Chivas USA with four assists on the season. In 2010, Mayén played in four matches (two starts) before he was loaned to Miami FC on August 6. Mayén played with the United States U-20 National Team at numerous camps and tournaments throughout 2008 and 2009, including the FIFA U-20 World Cup in Egypt. Born in Los Angeles, Calif., on February 9, 1989, Mayén attended Manual Arts High School. His parents, Raúl Armando and Aldanubia, are natives of El Salvador; Mayen is fluent in English and Spanish and is the youngest of five children.

21 • Brian Shriver • Midfielder • 5'11 • 160 lbs • 8/5/1987

Shriver is a Clearwater, Florida native who played his college soccer at the University of North Carolina. FC Dallas later drafted him in the second round. He scored four goals in twenty-nine appearances last season for Miami FC.

22 • Aaron Hohlbein • Defender • 6'0 • 180 lbs • 8/16/1985

Hohlbein, 25, played college soccer at the University of Wisconsin and was later drafted by the Kansas City Wizards with the third overall selection in the 2007 MLS Supplemental Draft. In 2010 he made 10 appearances for Miami FC, being team captain during the last five matches of the season, in which the club went undefeated

23 • Martin Nunez • Midfielder/Forward • 5'6 • 160 lbs • 2/2/1987

Nuñez started his professional career in 2008 with the Carolina RailHawks. The South Florida native immediately made an impact on the team, and in twenty-eight games he scored five goals, being later named a finalist for the Rookie of the Year award. One year later, he joined the Puerto Rico Islanders where he helped the team reach the 2009 CFU Club Championship.

24 • Matt Glaeser • Goalkeeper • 6'4 • 190 lbs • 4/27/1985

Glaeser, a Virginia native started his college career at James Madison University and Hartford University, here he was the America East Conference Goalkeeper of the Year and the NSCAA Northeast Region Goalkeeper of the Year as a senior. Glaeser returned to the US in 2010 and signed with Miami FC.

25 • Patrick Otte • Midfielder 5'8 • 170 lbs • 10/22/1991

Otte was a member of the United States U-18 Men's National Team. The 5'8" midfielder from Thousand Oaks, California spent time at England's Middlesborough Academy. He also played most recently with the Ventura County Fusion in California.

26 • Cristian Arrieta • Defender • 6'2 • 190 lbs • 9/18/1979

Arrieta is one of the most decorated recent Division 2 players as he received the 2009 Defender of the Year award during his two-year long tenure with the Puerto Rico Islanders. In 2010, he appeared in 16 games for the MLS side Philadelphia Union. During his time with Puerto Rico, he helped the club advance to the semifinals of the CONCACAF Champions League in 2009. During Arrieta's time with the Islanders, the club won the 2008 Commissioners Cup while he established a remarkable offensive record for a defender. In 2009 Arrieta finished the season with seven goals and two assists, ranking him ninth in goals. In early 2010, Arrieta was ranked 14th in the USL First Division Top 25 of the decade, which announced a list of the best and most influential players of the previous decade. Before he returned to North America in 2008, Arrieta played soccer in Italy for such clubs as Genoaand Lecce.

27 • Martyn Lancaster • Defender • 6'1 • 180 lbs • 11/10/1980

Martyn Lancaster is an England native who played his first season with the Blues last year, starting in 21 matches. He appeared in 95 games for Chester City in the English Football League and Football Conference between 1998 and 2003. He also played for Swedish side Ljungskile Sk and for Queen of the South in Scotland.

39 • Phillip Lammare • Goalkeeper • 6'2 • 190 lbs • 9/18/1987

Lamarre is a native of Margate, Florida and played college soccer at Florida Atlantic University, before transferring to Florida International University his senior year. In his junior year at FAU, Lamarre held the school record for most shutouts, most saves, and most wins. He started his professional career in 2010 when he signed with FC Tampa Bay

81 • Jean Philippe Peguero • Forward • 5'11 • 180 lbs • 9/29/1981

Peguero began his career with Haitian club Don Bosco in 2002 before joining the Colorado Rapids of MLS. Peguero played two seasons for Colorado, before signing with the New York Red Bulls for the 2006 season. After the 2006 season, Peguero signed with Brondby IF of the Danish Superliga where he played for two seasons. Peguero has also appeared for the Haitian National Team 19 times scoring 13 goals.
