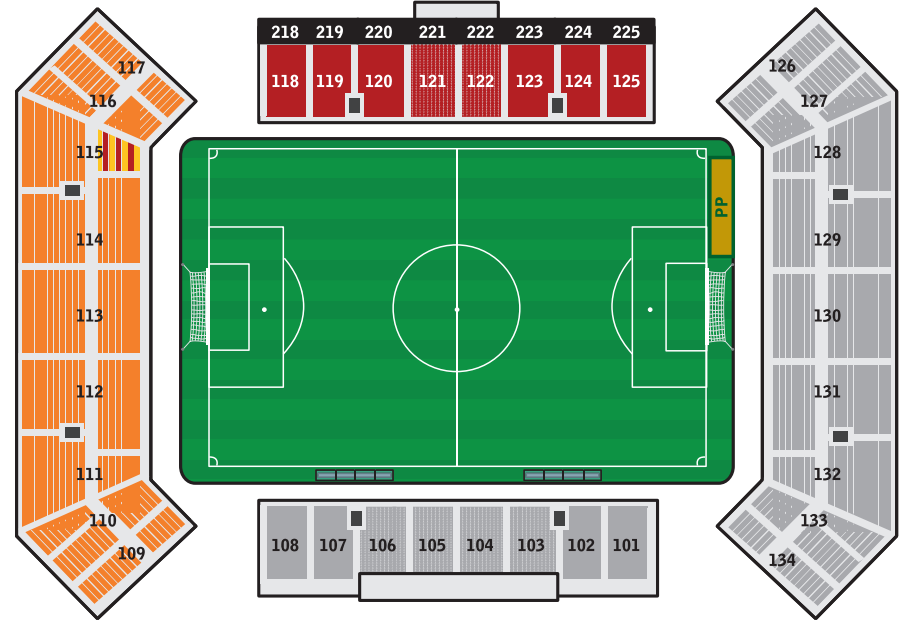

2012: Attacking midfielder Mark Anderson officially joined the Fort Lauderdale Strikers on March 22, 2012. The Englishman signs his first professional contract after a successful showing at the 2012 NASL Combine and preseason with the Strikers.

Amateur: Played for amateur side Baton Rouge Capitals of the USL Premier Development League in 2010. Anderson was teammates with former Strikers' defender Scott Gordon, now of Major League Soccer's Chivas USA.

College: Anderson enjoyed a very successful college soccer career at Barry University between 2008 and 2010. In three seasons he scored a total of 38 goals and racked up 28 assists in 53 appearances. Anderson was named the 2011 Daktronics DII National Soccer Player of the Year and 2011 Capital One Academic All-America of the Year for DII men's soccer.

As a freshman, Anderson set several records for the Buccaneers. He scored at least one goal in nine consecutive appearances, posted a school record of 11 assists, and broke the record for points in a season with 33. Anderson led the nation in assists per game (0.786) and was 7th in the nation for points per game.

In his native England, Anderson played for Roseberry Sports College. He was a prolific scorer, averaging more than a goal per game in 2007: 43 goals in 35 games. Anderson was named Sportsman Of the Year Award in 2006 and 2007. He was given a scholarship to Barry University based on his performances.

Youth: Anderson was a former youth scholar at Sunderland A.F.C. He was let go by the club as a 16 year-old.

International: Represented Great Britain at the 2011 World University Games in Shenzhen, China. Anderson started every game for Great Britain, scoring twice en route to an appearance in the final. The team collected silver medals having lost 2-0 to Japan in the championship game.

Anderson has been capped by the England Schoolboys at the U-18 level.

2012: Toronto FC selected UConn defender Nickardo Blake as the 14th pick of the 2012 MLS Supplemental Draft. He joined the club during preseason camp, but was let go shortly after. Blake returned to Florida to spend preseason trialing with his local NASL club, the Fort Lauderdale Strikers.

Blake, 22, signed with the Fort Lauderdale Strikers on March 28, 2012 following a successful preseason with the club. He will wear the number six jersey, last worn by compatriot Lance Laing who switched to number 16.

College: Attended the University of Connecticut where he was a starter for the men's soccer team for during his two years at the school. The right fullback started every game for the Huskies his senior year.

Blake started his college soccer career at East Central Junior College. In two seasons with the Falcons he was a two-time NJCAA Men's Soccer Second Team All-American, and a NSCAA All-American in 2009. Blake was selected to the NJCAA Region XVI First Team and the Midwest Community College Athletic Conference First Team each year.

Blake was teammates with current Strikers' goalkeeper Lionel Brown at East Central Junior College and the University of Connecticut.

Personal: Blake moved to the United States as a 13 year-old from Clarendon, Jamaica. He settled in Lauderdale and attended Boyd Anderson High School, where he was a standout on the soccer team, as well as a track star and a field goal kicker for the football team.

2012: South Florida native Lionel Brown signed his first professional with his hometown side, the Fort Lauderdale Strikers ahead of the 2012 North American Soccer League season. The club announced his signing, along with Darnell King and Hosman Ramos, on March 27, 2012.

College: Brown started his college soccer career at East Central Junior College in St. Louis. A starter his first two seasons, Brown recorded an impressive record of 25-12-6 and kept 16 clean sheets. Brown was named to the First Team All-Region and Second Team All-Conference.

Brown transferred to the University of Connecticut from East Central College his junior year, and stayed with the Huskies through the 2011 season.

He was teammates with current Strikers' defender Nickardo Blake at East Central Junior College and the University of Connecticut.

Personal: South Florida native Lionel Brown attended Coconut Creek High School. He was team captain and BCAA All-Star Goalie and an All-State Honorable Mention.

2012: Third times a charm for local midfielder Abel Gebor. Having tried out for the Fort Lauderdale Strikers on no less than three separate occasions, Abel Gebor finally joined the club on his third attempt.

The 22 year-old resident of Lauderdale Lakes put pen to paper on his first professional contract with the Strikers on March 13, 2012, becoming an official member of his hometown club.

Amateur: Gebor played amateur soccer with Fort Lauderdale Schulz Academy of the USL Premier Development League, the fourth tier of the American Soccer Pyramid.

At Schulz Academy Gebor trained under the direction of Josef Schulz, the trainer famous for developing United States national team forward Jozy Altidore.

College: Gebor had a short spell in college soccer, playing briefly with Tyler Junior College and Lon Morris Junior College upon graduating from high school.

Personal: Gebor is a native of Liberia who left the country in 2003 to come to the United States.

He attended three different open tryouts for the Fort Lauderdale Strikers and trained with the team for two years before officially signing a contract with the club.



24 MATT GLAESER

2012: Glaeser returns to the Strikers for the 2012 season as the undisputed number one goalkeeper at the club.

2011: New recruit Nic Platter started the 2011 season in goal as Matt Glaeser was hospitalized with pneumonia. Glaeser overcame the condition and returned to the lineup in May, featuring in a 1-1 draw with the NSC Minnesota Stars, and again in the 0-0 draw against the Atlanta Silverbacks. Since, he kept his place in the side as the first-choice goalkeeper, starting the 25 remaining matches for the Strikers, logging a total of 2,355 minutes. Glaeser shut out the opposition a total of 12 times, while conceding just 27. His GAA of 1.00 was among the lowest in the league. Recognized as NASL Defensive Player of the Week for week 12. Rewarded with a new contract on July 5th that ties him to the club through the 2012 season, with an option for 2013.

2010: Glaeser returned to the States in 2010, after a single season with Pallo-Iirot in Finland. He signed with Miami FC (now the Fort Lauderdale Strikers) of the USSF Division 2. Glaeser spent a brief period on loan with FC Tampa Bay as injury cover but did not make any appearances for the team. Upon his return to South Florida, Miami FC handed Glaeser his debut in a 2-1 victory against the Montreal Impact on September 11. He finished the 2010 season as the starting goalkeeper for the Blues.

**Professional:** Finnish third-tier side Pallo-Iirot snapped up Glaeser after he impressed during a trial with the club. He signed his first professional contract with the side, and was given the number one jersey.

**Amateur:** After being overlooked in the 2008 MLS SuperDraft, Glaeser signed for amateur side Western Mass Pioneers of the USL Premier Development League. He made a total of 20 appearances for the Massachusetts-based team.

**College:** Glaeser started his college career at James Madison University in 2003, before transferring to University of Hartford in 2006. He would become the captain and MVP of the side. Glaeser was recognized as the 2008 American East Conference Goalkeeper of the Year, as well as the 2008 NSCAA Northeast Region Goalkeeper of the Year reflecting an exceptional season in his final year.

2012: On March 2, the Fort Lauderdale Strikers announced that 19 year-old Yoximar Granado will be back in action for the club in 2012.

2011: Following an unsuccessful trial with the Chicago Fire of Major League Soccer, Yoximar Granado signed his first professional contract with the Fort Lauderdale Strikers on April 14, 2011. The very next day Granado made his professional debut with the Strikers, replacing Mike Palacio in the 58th minute of the Strikers 1-1 draw against the NSC Minnesota Stars at Lockhart Stadium. The speedy winger scored his first professional goal with the club in the next home meeting with the Stars, a 3-0 victory on June 11, blasting the ball into the roof of the net from an acute angle.

Yoximar featured mostly from the bench in 2011, starting just five of his 19 appearances. He scored one goal, and added one assist.

**Youth:** Granado is a product of football school Club Deportivo Escuela de Futbol Carlos Sarmiento Lora, in Colombia. The school trained Colombian internationals Mario Yepes and Faryd Mondragón during their younger years.

2012: Following a successful preseason with the club, local product Aly Hassan signed with his hometown club, the Fort Lauderdale Strikers, on March 24, 2012.

Hassan will wear the number 15 for the Strikers during the 2012 season.

College: Hassan played four years of college soccer at Nova Southeastern University. He is fifth among all-time goalscorers at the university, having scored a total of 36 goals for the Sharks.

As a freshman in 2007, Hassan scored 11 goals and contributed five assists in 18 games. He was an at-large first team selection of the 2007 All-Sunshine State Conference Men's Soccer Team. Won All-Sunshine State Conference First-Team honors his senior year as well.

Youth: Hassan is a product of Schulz Academy. The academy, based in South Florida, has produced several professional players, notably AZ and United States' national team forward, Jozy Altidore.

Hassan also played with local youth side Weston Fury. He and several teammates spent time training in Argentina at one of the country's elite facilities.

International: Hassan has represented the United States at the U-20 level. In August 2008, he earned his first cap with the United States U-20 National Team in a friendly against Guatemala.

Personal: Weston resident Hassan has family from both Colombia and Egypt.

In 2011 Hassan spent preseason with famous Hungarian side Ferencváros as well as with Astra Ploiești in the top division of Romania. He never signed professional terms with either club.

26 ANDY HERRON

2012: Costa Rican international Andy Herron became the first new signing of the Fort Lauderdale Strikers ahead of the 2012 NASL season. The 33 year-old returns to the United States, having previously played in the MLS, and reunites with Daryl Shore, his former coach at the Chicago Fire.

Professional: Andy Herron brings 15 years of professional experience to the Strikers. He played with no fewer than eleven clubs during his professional career.

Herron started his career with his hometown side AD Limonense. He moved on to bigger Costa Rican teams, Santos de Guápiles and C.S. Herediano, before venturing to the United States to play with the Chicago Fire. In his last season with Herediano, Herron led the team with 14 goals and 13 assists.

With the Chicago Fire, Herron was one of Major League Soccer's top scorers. He was an integral part of the Fire team that won the 2006 Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup, and was tied for top goalscorer with four goals in the tournament. Herron's time with Chicago was marked with controversy. After elbowing Jay Heaps in the face during a match against the New England Revolution, he was given a six game suspension without pay.

Herron briefly went back to Costa Rica on loan to Herediano from Chicago Fire. He then spent the 2007 season with the Columbus Crew, scoring four goals in 18 appearances. He re-signed with the Chicago Fire for the 2008 MLS season, but was let go by the club in November after a lackluster season.

He returned to Herediano for his third spell with the club, but left the club after one just one season. Herron spent the next few years bouncing around clubs in Central America before signing with the Strikers in 2012.

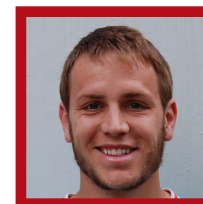

2010: On March 18, 2010 Thompson signed with Miami FC (now the Fort Lauderdale Strikers) of the USSF Division 2, after playing five seasons in MLS.

Thompson enjoyed a prolific first season in South Florida, as the second-highest scorer on the team with nine goals. His six goals scored in September, including a hat-trick against AC St. Louis, helped Miami FC to a late playoff push, though the team ultimately fell just short.

Thompson broke numerous team records and collected several accolades at the University of Maryland including; NSCAA third team All-America selection, All-ACC first team honoree, Maryland Student-Athlete of the Week, Maryland/adidas Soccer Challenge Offensive MVP, ACC Player of the Week, co-MVP of the Maryland/adidas Classic, Virginia/Nike Classic all-tournament team and was a member of the College Soccer News team of the week. He was named a Herman Trophy semifinalist in both 2003 and 2004. Thompson is the school's all-time leader in points with 112.

**Youth:** Earned the Golden Boot Award at the 1999 U.S. U-17 National Championship playing for club side Braddock Road Warhawks. Thompson also won the 1999 Don Greer Cup whilst playing for them.

**International:** Abe Thompson was one of the most promising young American forwards of his generation. It took him all of three minutes to score in his international debut with the U.S. Under-17 Men's National Team. Thompson represented the United States at the 1999 FIFA U-17 World Championship in New Zealand, playing alongside such figures as Oguchi Onyewu, DaMarcus Beasley, and Landon Donovan. He earned six caps and scored one goal with the U-17s.

In 2000, at just 18 years of age, Thompson began playing with the U.S. Under-20 Men's National Team.

## MEDIA INFORMATION

### NASL RULES & REGULATIONS

**Structure:** The 8 active NASL teams compete in one table consisting of all 8 teams, the Atlanta Silverbacks; Carolina RailHawks; FC Edmonton; Fort Lauderdale Strikers; Minnesota Stars FC; Puerto Rico Islanders; San Antonio Scorpions and the Tampa Bay Rowdies.

**Schedule:** Each team will play a 28-game regular season schedule. Each team will play 14 home and 14 away games. Each team will play each of the other 7 NASL teams twice at home and twice away.

**Point System:** Teams will receive three points for a win, one point for a tie and zero points for a loss.

**Referees:** All referees for NASL matches played in the United States are nationally certified referees assigned by the U.S. Soccer Federation (USSF). The Canadian Soccer Association (CSA) assigns referees for all matches played in Canada. The Federación Puertorriqueña de Fútbol (FPF) will assign referees for all matches played in Puerto Rico.

**Game Clock:** The official game time for all NASL games will be managed on the field by the referee. If necessary, the referee may also allot extra time (a.k.a. "stoppage time") at the end of each period (first half, second half, and if applicable, first overtime period and second overtime period during playoff games) to allow for injuries, time-wasting or other disturbances.

*Note: The stadium clock will display the time from 0:00 to 45:00 and from 45:00 to 90:00 (plus stoppage time where applicable in each half). For statistical purposes, the minutes for goals, substitutions, yellow cards, etc., will be listed from the first minute until the 90th minute. A goal scored at 15 minutes 10 seconds will be listed as having been scored in the 16th minute. Events occurring during stoppage time will follow the international norm by being demarcated with a "+" sign. For example, a goal scored three minutes into first half stoppage time will be officially identified as happening at "45+".*

**Roster Composition:** Each NASL team's full roster shall be no less than 20 and no more than 35 total players. Players can compete on a maximum of 2 teams per season.

**Active Roster and Inactive Roster:** At no time may any team name more than 30 eligible players on its Active Roster. Only players listed on an Active Roster are eligible to play in any game. Once a player is listed on a team's Inactive Roster, that player must remain on the Inactive Roster for at least 30 days. In order for a team to change a player from the Active Roster to the inactive roster or vice versa, the team must notify the NASL Registrar, in writing, at least 48 hours prior to the game for which the team intends for such change to take effect. The League Office will make the final determination on whether players are on each team's Active Roster or Inactive Roster for any game.



## NASL RULES & REGULATIONS (CONT.)

**Domestic Players:** A domestic player for teams based in the United States and Puerto Rico is either a U.S. citizen, a permanent resident (green card holder) or the holder of other special status (e.g. refugee or asylum status). A domestic player for teams based in Canada is either a Canadian citizen, a permanent resident, or qualifies as a domestic player in the United States as set forth in the guidelines above.

**International Players:** Each team may list up to 7 non-domestic players on its roster.

**Game Day Rosters:** Each team may nominate 18 players from its Active Roster for a game day roster. Teams are allowed 3 substitutions per game.

**Cautions and Suspensions:** A player will be suspended for one game upon receiving his fifth yellow card – regardless of the nature of the infraction which resulted in his being awarded the yellow card. After a player has accumulated 5 yellow cards, he will earn an additional one-game suspension for each additional 3 yellow cards he accumulates. A player receiving two yellow cards in the same game will be suspended for the next game; however for the purposes of accumulated yellow cards he will be considered to have received just one red card. A player receiving a direct red card will automatically be suspended for the next game, and the NASL Disciplinary Committee has the power to suspend him for additional games depending upon the severity of the offense which led to the red card issued by the referee.

**Card Suspensions:** Red card and yellow card accumulation suspensions earned in regular season games will be served in that player's next regular season game. Any suspension for yellow card accumulation earned in a player's last regular season game will carry over into that season's first playoff game for his team.

Any player who receives a red card in his team's last game of the season (NASL regular season match or during playoff games), will serve the one-game suspension during their next game (whether it comes during a playoff game, championship series game, or in the first regular season game of the following season). All card suspensions will, if necessary, follow a player to a new team.

**Suspension Manipulation:** Players suspended from NASL games (regular season and playoff games) that are called in for national team duty will have their suspensions held in abeyance until they return to their NASL team. Teams will be responsible for informing the League Office of a player's selection to national team duty. Failure to provide the League Office with such notice or to withhold the use of a suspended player when appropriate is subject to sanctions.

### Playoff Qualification:

The top 6 teams in the league standings at the conclusion of the regular season will compete in the NASL playoffs.

### Tie-breaking Procedure for Standings and Playoff Qualification:

The team with the highest position in the standings at the conclusion of the regular season will be the team with the greatest number of points (3 points for a win, 1 point for a tie, 0 points for a loss). In the event that two teams finish the regular season with an equal number of points, the following system will be used to break the tie:

- 1) If the teams are still equal in the standings, the highest position shall be awarded to the team with the greater goal difference against all other teams during the regular season (goal differential).
- 2) If the teams are still equal in the standings, the highest position shall be awarded to the team scoring the greatest number of total goals against all other teams during the regular season (total goals).
- 3) The highest position shall be awarded to the team with the best win/tie/loss record in regular season games against all other teams equal in points (head-to-head competition).

4) If the teams are still equal in the standings, the procedures described in this section shall be applied only to games played on the road by each team against all other teams during the regular season.

5) If the teams are still equal in the standings, the procedures described in this section shall be applied only to games played at home by each team against all other teams during the regular season.

6) If the teams are still equal in the standings, the highest position in the standings shall be determined by a toss of a coin.

7) The first tiebreaker in a three-way tie is also goal difference, if two teams are on goal difference, the next tie-breaker is goals scored.

*NOTE: If two clubs remain tied after another club with the same number of points advances during any step, the tie breaker reverts to step 1 of the two-club tie-breaking system*

**Playoff Format:**

The 6 qualifying teams will be given seeds 1 through 6 with the top team in the standings receiving the number 1 seed.

The format of the Playoffs will consist of a Quarterfinal Round, Semifinal Round and a Final Round. The Quarterfinal Round will be a single game while the Semifinal and Final Rounds will each be a 2-game series with each team playing at home once and the team with the greater number of aggregate goals in both games winning each series.

The number 1 seed and the number 2 seed will receive a bye directly to the Semifinal Round while the number 3 seed will host the number 6 seed and the number 4 seed will host the number 5 seed in the Quarterfinal Round.

For the Semifinal Round, the number 1 seed will be paired with the lowest seeded team to qualify from the Quarterfinal Round with the number 2 seed being paired with the highest seeded team to qualify from the Quarterfinal Round.

The winners of each series in the Semifinal Round will meet in the Final Round. In the event of a draw in either Quarterfinal Round game, such game will progress to a 30-minute extra time period (the golden goal rule will not be in effect). If the teams are still locked in a draw following the extra time period, the winner will be determined by a penalty shootout.

In each Semifinal Round series and the Final Round series, if the teams are tied on the number of aggregate goals scored in the series at the conclusion of the second game, the teams will progress to a 30-minute extra time period. As in the Quarterfinal Round, the golden goal rule will not be in effect. If the teams are still locked in a draw following the extra time period, the winner of the series will be determined by a penalty shootout.

**Cards in Playoffs:**

All players will start the NASL playoffs with a zero yellow card total. A player receiving 3 yellow cards in separate games during the course of the playoffs will be suspended for his team's next game. Any suspension for yellow cards received in a player's last playoff game will not carry over into the next NASL regular season.
